Post Observes Veteran's Day

Brooks - Shepard Post of the American Legion observed Veterans' Day, November 11th, with a dinner at the First Methodist Church. Highlight of the evening was a colorful slide show of Civil War battlegrounds moderated by Julian Lowell, Vice - Principal of Benjamin Franklin High School, Rochester.

The youthful educator who has hobbled at the Civil War since boyhood - since he first heard accounts while perched on his grandfather's lap on the scene at Gettysburg - Mr. Lowell brought home to the gathering the apparent recentness of this bloody conflict, even passing around lead pellets, "minnies" which he had dug from areas visited. His slides showed the scars of a war that took the lives of one of eight soldiers, considerably more proportionately than either World War I or II. His talk was spiced with a number of humorous incidents experienced while collecting the pictures.

Rev. Harold F. Hewitt, host minister and chaplain of the affair, welcomed the guests and spoke briefly on the mutual obligations of the American Legion and the Church to the community. Gorton Baker was songmaster for the evening with Mrs. Herman E. Betz accompanying adeptly at the piano. Roy W. Harmon served as master of ceremonies. Dinner was prepared and served by the First Methodist Church staff.


